Reflection on the Jubilee of the World of Communications

Read the following reflection out during Mass/within your faith communities over the weekend of 14 – 15 June 2025, or distribute for personal reflection.

Communication is the process by which information, ideas, and feelings are exchanged between individuals. It is the inherent way humans relate to each other and the world. As Christians, we have a responsibility to communicate in a Christ-like manner—one that builds relationships, promotes connections, and cultivates a sense of encounter.

In light of the theme for World Day of Communications, which calls for a spirit of gentleness in our communication, we are reminded of the power of words. Communication, whether in person or through digital platforms, should always be conducted with humility, compassion, and a deep desire to foster understanding and unity. The goal of communication is not just to exchange information, but to build trust and connection, reflecting the love of Christ.





In 2023, the Vatican released <u>a pastoral reflection on how we engage with social media</u>, which can also be applied to our everyday communication.

The reflection challenges us to be known as people who:

- · Listen attentively and with empathy,
- Discern before acting,
- Treat all people with respect,
- Respond with questions rather than judgment, and
- Remain silent rather than triggering judgement.

In our modern world, especially through social media, it's easy to communicate quickly but not always thoughtfully. As believers, we are called to communicate with intention, moving toward encounters that are meaningful and lasting, not superficial and fleeting.

As we continue to reflect on the theme of World Day of Communications, let us remember that we are called to be communicators of love, unity, and peace—whether in person or online. Let us strive to follow the example of gentleness and respect, ensuring our words contribute to healing divisions and building bridges. In doing so, we can become instruments of Christ's love, fostering a sense of belonging in every interaction.

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Suggestions for celebrating this Jubilee in your communities

- Use the Provided Prayers of the Faithful or Write Your Own
 Craft prayers that acknowledge the importance of communication in spreading the
 Gospel, asking for wisdom and discernment in using media responsibly.
- Share Special Prayers During Gatherings
 Include prayers that focus on the role of communication in faith-building, recognizing those who work in media, journalism, and social networks as instruments of truth.
- Read Out the Reflection During Mass or in Faith Communities

 Share a reflection on how communication affects our relationship with God and each other, with printed copies available for private or family reflection.
- Highlight Catholic Media and Communications Initiatives
 Promote Catholic radio stations, newspapers, and online platforms that support the Church's mission and encourage parishioners to engage with these resources.
